Outlaw, Michael Morpurgo


After a fierce storm, a boy discovers a human skull, buried beneath the roots of an ancient tree. A skull

GCSE GEOGRAPHERS EVALUATE REGENERATION

The GCSE Geography students recently took a trip to Birmingham to examine the city's regeneration efforts. Our trip began with a walk around the city completing a land use map, where we were able to see some of the key regeneration projects that have taken place over the past few years.

One of the most impressive projects we saw was the Bullring Shopping Centre, which has been transformed from a rundown retail centre into a vibrant, modern shopping destination. We looked at how the environment and identity has changed.

Throughout the trip, we had the opportunity to speak with local residents and business owners, who talked to us about how the regeneration efforts had impacted their lives and businesses. We also visited a number of areas that were still in the process of being redeveloped, giving us a sense of the ongoing challenges faced by the city.

Overall, the trip was a fascinating insight into the process of urban regeneration and the ways in which it can transform a city. We were able to see first-hand the impact that these projects can have on local residents and businesses, and gained a deeper understanding of the challenges that regeneration can present.
