Students First, It's About Learning, No Barriers

BLACK HISTORY MONTH





October is Black History Month in the UK, a time to recognise and celebrate the achievements of Black people in Britain. At The Hinckley School we have focused on the importance of recognising the contribution Black people have made to Britain over the last 10,000 years. Yes, that's right, scientists now believe that some of the earliest people in Britain had dark skin, we have been a diverse society for a lot longer than most people think. Whether it's the 10% + of the skeletons in Leicester's Roman cemeteries who have African heritage, to the trumpeter John Blanke who was part of Henry VIII's musical band, Black people have long been part of our nation's story.

All year groups have had assemblies and Personal Development sessions exploring Black achievements and challenging misconceptions. In The Bridge a Year 7 tutor group delivered a well-received assembly highlighting Black people who have made a real difference to UK, and world history. Abigail, in Year 11, supported the teaching in her year group by finding and sharing a super clip that encapsulated some of the key messages of BHM. Assemblies for Year 10 and 11 focussed on a doubly marginalised group - Black women and the fantastic work some individuals have done to develop our knowledge and culture. BHM also links to the book Year 9s are reading, A Change is going to Come, short stories written by minority authors, which seeks to widen the perspective of our students. The Hinckley Sixth Form joined in with discussion of key questions in their Personal Development sessions.

The students of the Year 8 Gateway were able to receive a unique insight into the lives of the Windrush Generation and their arrival in Britain. They met a

They heard about the struggles that not only the Windrush generation experienced, but also the generations that followed. It highlighted the racism, prejudice and persecution that these groups experienced, and their enormous contribution to our society.

Subject areas have gotten involved, showcasing Black high-achievers in their fields to raise our students' aspirations and show them that everyone can achieve. In History we have focussed on how our understanding of history is skewed because most of it has been written by rich white men, and how important it is to address that and find other voices to get a balanced picture.

The Hinckley School wants to be inclusive, we want all of our students to be aspirational and to feel supported. Our work on BHM is a small step towards this by opening all our students' eyes to the contributions and struggles of different groups, and making all of us more understanding of the world around us. -Ms Beale, Head of History

Did you know that our library regularly displays replicas of historical artefacts for students to interact with?

Currently on display in our Library are a replica of a Roman Helmet and a Stone Age Box filled with a faux skin, replica shoes, and tools, giving students from all year groups an insight into ancient civilisations. Students can even get hands-on with the items, by trying them on and examining them up close, in order to expand their understand. The artefacts are loaned from Creative Learning Services and new items are regularly added to share an insight into a new historical period.

We are encouraging students to take part in our new November Reading Challenge. All of the books in the challenge centre around the theme of mythology and link to our Classics curriculum.




