Prefix Re means 'again' and the root 'vision' means to see. So, revision is simply 'seeing

The word revision can also be associated with improving through changes - this is also a crucial in the revision process - if you study you can make gains and improvements as a result.

> When we are studying / revising, we want to move information from our Working Memory into our Long Term Memory

Working Memory (like your desktop / home screen)

Limited ability to retain & recall information in the same format (e.g. visual, sound, written etc)



Long Term Memory (like your hard drive)

Includes knowing "stuff" and knowing "how to do things'

When we are taking an exam, we want to move information from our Long Term Memory into our Working Memory

We need to practise moving information in both directions for these two

The Year 10 Team were delighted to meet with Welcome to GCSE Event 2023 parents/carers this week for our 'Welcome to GCSE' evening. Colleagues from the Year 10 Hub began the evening by outlining their vision for Year 10, and where students belong within the seven-year journey. Mr Toor then talked through the learning journeys of our core subjects and how our PRIDE character education can be used to support students development at home and at school. Miss Bull looked at the science behind revision and key strategies and shared techniques that families can use at home in order to support students in revisiting their learning.

students of all ages to come along!








Creative Writing - G1

In Miss Bailey's class on Thursday students calculated the volume of a prism and shared their answers using mini white boards. The class will now progress on to



calculating the volume of other shapes before moving on to surface areas. Once they complete this topic the year group will begin learning about 'Linear Graphs Transformations and Constructions', as they progress along their learning journey.
