TRANSFORMATIONAL OFSTED - 'GOOD'

It is with great pleasure that we are able to announce that The Hinckley School has been awarded a 'Good' rating by Ofsted.

Inspectors rated The Hinckley School as 'Good' in all areas: The Quality of Education, Behaviour and Attitudes, Personal Development, Leadership and Management and Sixth-form Provision.

This 'Good' rating is truly transformational for our school and we are delighted that The Hinckley School's long journey of improvement, investment and growth has now finally been recognised. The decision of the Ofsted inspection team to rate our school as 'Good' in all areas and to release our report so quickly, demonstrates their confidence in their decision and that we have built a community with high expectations.

On Monday 26th September we were delighted to welcome author David Farr, author of 'The Book of Stolen Dreams' and 'The Secret of the Blood Red Key'

Organised by Librarian Ms Crisp, the event saw all of Year 7 gather in The Bridge for an inspirational talk and creative writing task. Students heard about David Farr's background, writing plays and tv shows, including, 'The Night Manager' and how lockdown and his family inspired him to write his first book. David captivated the audience as he read exerts from both of this books and students engaged eagerly when they had opportunities to share their thoughts and opinions on characters and storylines.

In a later part of the event, students split into groups of three to write one opening sentence to a story. David then selected nine students at random to read out their sentences, praising them for their imagination, creativity and writing skills, as well as sharing useful and supportive feedback and suggestions for continuing the stories further. During the talk Oly shared his own story, including his struggles with OCD and seeking help, with students sharing how inspiring they found the talk. Students engaged really positively with the group discussions and left with a better understanding of how and when they should seek support for their own mental health.


Year 9

W.I.L.E, also known as The Wombles In Litter Education, is a dedicated volunteer group formed in 2020 with a profound mission — to change the way our children think about litter in our environment. Their aim is to counteract the lack of respect some individuals show when discarding waste, all while promoting a profound sense of responsibility for our planet.


